

Editorial: Extra-ordinary Time

This e-edition of the Marksman is for the months June to August. On Sunday 1st June the long period of 'Ordinary Time' in the calendar of the Church begins; the period after the feasting of Easter-tide. The colour scheme of the vestments shifts from gold and white to green, for the ordinariness of the grass some would say.

In fact, the use of the term ordinary here is in the sense of counting the ordinal number (first, second, third..) of weeks after Trinity Sunday, on and on through the summer.

Our nation, like others nations of the world, is counting the weeks as lockdown continues.

We are currently in extra-ordinary circumstances of living, straining to remember what normal felt like. Is this the new ordinary?

The recollections and thoughts in this magazine are on the theme of adventure. This was chosen by the planning group pre-COVID. Adventure is the process of arriving at a new place, often in the context of an unusual, exciting or dangerous activity, process or journey by which something happens.

The word does not describe our current situation. What will life be like when we emerge gradually to embrace the world as we knew it? Some of us are already feeling the pain of loss – of love ones, health, job, freedom. Some are discovering new skills, new things about ourselves, new ways of being. Nothing will be quite the same again.

Eventually the church will be permitted to unlock its doors – maybe during Ordinary time. I live in hope! For now, the website (and facebook page) is very much open and refreshed at least every Sunday with the weekly newssheet and material for worship including hymns and homily. 2020 adventuring, missionary style

I used to think missionaries were the great explorers and colonists of the nineteenth century - David Livingstone, Eric Liddell and the like. Now I know differently. Because I find I

have become a millennial missionary.

After nearly 50 years of working for a living, I decided in retirement to branch out. My resolution led to a Masters degree in Theology and to active Christian life, leading me into realms I never knew existed. A holiday visit morphed into a wish to spend time working in Tanzania, where Rochester Diocese is linked with two companion diocese. Then my first extended visit to St Philip's Theological College in Tanzania, where I am now a visiting lecturer.

For me this is adventure big time.
Teaching itself is a challenge (as every UK teacher will vouch), compounded by language and cultural differences.
Poverty is real and everywhere. The very practical challenges of life in subsistence tropical Africa mean that food and power cannot be taken for granted, and transport becomes an expensive luxury.

I meet remarkable people. As this article is supposed to be about missionaries, I will mention a few. Helen H is a priest from Australia, and in 20 years has developed a girls' educational complex in

the North - nursery, kindergarten, primary and secondary schools, and a sewing/life skills centre. She fizzes with ideas and new schemes. Helen E from the UK visits every year to teach English at the local theological college and help at the schools.

At St Philips there is a steady procession of modern missionaries - nurses, teachers, handymen, priests, home makers. Some defy an easy label. Janet came to St Philips for 2 years, and ended up staying 14, running the college administration. Wendy from USA is dedicated to helping families cope with disability. She now directs the college outreach programme, and is leading Tanzanian efforts to improve national disability access.

Adventure, inspiration, and remarkable people: some of the blessings God bestows on modern missionaries.

Survival against the odds: Ernest Shackleton's rescue mission

From 1914, a true survival story: an epic of courage, endurance, leadership and teamwork, and unsurpassed skills of seamanship and navigation. Aided by God's Providence.

Endurance, the exploration ship of the 1914 British Antarctic Expedition, was home to 28 crew. led by Ernest Shackleton. She was crushed by ice and sank as winter came on. In those pre-satnav days of sail there was no chance of rescue.

The crew's only hope was to launch three small boats and battle the advancing ice. They landed on Elephant Island, a bleak uninhabited rock. The only option was for six of them to take to the Southern Ocean in an open boat and make for South Georgia, 1000 sea miles away.

For 15 days and nights the six battled the worst the ocean could throw at them, till they saw land. They arrived in a hurricane so fierce it threatened disaster: 'For three hours, our thirst almost forgotten, we looked Death squarely in the eye. It was not so much terrifying as chilling, especially with



the ceaseless rush of breaking seas over us'. It was another 24 hours before they could make it ashore.

But they were the wrong side of South Georgia. To get to the whaling station, and help, they had to cross impassable mountains: 'the hell that reigns up there in heavy storms blind a man and take

away his senses. No man could live in some of the gales where we stood'. Three days later, Shackleton, Worsley and Crean reached habitation. 'The Norwegians told us afterwards there was never another day for the rest of the winter when we could have lived through on top of the mountains. Providence had certainly looked after us'. They also learned that on the terrible journey each of them 'had a strange feeling that there had been a fourth in our party'.

After 100 days and three failed attempts, all the men were rescued. Worsley said of Shackleton: 'By self-sacrifice and throwing his own life into the balance he saved every one of his men - not a life was lost although at times it looked unlikely one could be saved'.

Adventures- Bromley after Lockdown

COVID-19 took its toll on our planet last year. Hundreds of thousands died and many more were sick. But despite all of that suffering and turmoil, the coronavirus outbreak had a few positive impacts on our world. Global pollution levels plummeted, reaching lows that no one would've imagined. Animals under the great threat of extinction began returning

to their natural habitats for the first time in decades. And people got the time to bond and spend with their loved ones that they usually would never have. So this year, in 2021, after our world has steadily recovered from COVID-19, Bromley Council decided to make some lasting changes to our borough with the intentions of sustaining those positive impacts the virus brought.

Firstly, the gardens behind Churchill Theatre were restored. More flowers and trees were planted to extend the green space in the area. The bushes and shrubs overlapping the pathways have been trimmed neatly, and the wild birds in the area now get looked after by the council; they have their own feeders on branches near their nests where they lay. A majestic marble fountain has been constructed nearby with an ample volume of



water for whenever the neighbouring animals require it.

The park by Bromley Civic Centre has also undergone some changes. More benches have been constructed with tables around the space so that people can socialise together under the sun. A new basketball court and astroturf area have just finished development nearby the pavilion; these new

recreational zones are great for community sporting activities.

Bromley Library has just been remodelled after much anticipation and excitement. The old computers have been replaced with new. sleek, more responsive ones. Another floor has been designed for collaborative study; this will be tremendously useful for students wishing to concentrate and get work done after school together. A larger variety of books have been bought for the library by the council, and now members of the public can borrow more at a time.

With all of these changes, Bromley is sure to be a newer adventure to explore for the community...

However, I wanted to explore how this would fit in with the theme of Adventure.

Roget's Thesaurus places Adventure in the groups of event, chance, pursuit and trial. That's fair enough. Interestingly it is grouped with Advent under event.

Nuttall's dictionary of Synonyms and Antonyms lists venture, risk, hazard,

imperil, experiment, trial, crisis, occurrence, romance, transaction and speculation.

Finally, in 1913, Webster's dictionary defines adventure in many ways, including "a noteworthy event or experience in one's life."

One of my conclusions is that following the CoE Easter Pilgrim series is a form of adventure. Pilgrimage is a spiritual as well as a physical adventure.

'Not iPod but my pod': A Land of Promise, Prophets and Patriarchs

Travellers returning from the Holy Land have reminded me of my adventures there and the taste of cardamon in my coffee.


I recall the stillness of a cave behind the rather lurid nativity grotto in Bethlehem and the hospitality of the inhabitants who shared lunch and songs with us and told us of the challenges of living under siege behind a high wall with gunposts.

I felt humbled following Jesus's route on Palm Sunday and walking the Way of the Cross through the streets of old Jerusalem to the place of Crucifixion, and later on being in the Garden of Gethsemane at night among ancient olive trees reflecting on Jesus's betrayal and sufferings.

Going to the Temple Mount and overlooking the rock sacred to three faiths encouraged me to hope for a brighter future where reconciliation might be possible, and this was enhanced by listening to the inspirational leaders of the Musalala programme, who take young people from the different communities camping in the wilderness and get them working together. Watching a multifaith dance troupe also lifted my spirits.

I have been moved by the living water and lush pastures of the River Jordan, the oasis and frontier town of Jericho and the expanses of desert running down to the Dead Sea with it's pillars of salt. However, it is the Sea of Galilee which has left me with the most abiding impressions, as it is here, where Jesus was

fishing, teaching, healing and eating breakfast on the beach, that He seemed closest. Sitting among meadow flowers beside the waves on the shore I found the Beatitudes, including his words 'Blessed are the Peacemakers' particularly stirring.



Serenity seemed elusive, though, when having to argue with a dishonest taxi driver and opportunistic shopkeeper in the bazaar. I was also disturbed when local Christians told me how many of them have already left the country to escape oppression and conflict.

Where is liberation? Suddenly I recall a rainbow over the lake and good travelling companions, and a garden with an empty tomb with the sign 'He is not here. He is Risen'.

The Campaign Against Living Miserably (CALM) is leading a movement against suicide, the single biggest killer of men under 45 in the UK and the cause of 18 deaths every day.

CALM offers a free and confidential phone and web chat support service for people in crisis— 7 hours a day, 7 days a week for anyone who needs to talk about life's problems. They also support those bereaved by suicide, through the Support After Suicide Partnership (SASP).

CALM helps communities by supporting parents, siblings, partners, friends and colleagues. The charity spreads its message in universities, pubs, clubs and prisons across the country – so that people feel empowered to share their experiences and get the help they need

CALM campaign with media partners, brands and ambassadors to spread awareness of suicide and its devastating impact, with campaigns like #Project84, #DontBottleItUp and The Best

Man Project. 'We challenge boring male stereotypes and encourage positive behavioural change and help-seeking behaviour, using cultural touch points like art, music, sport and comedy'.

CALM was first launched as a pilot by the Dept of Health in Manchester in 1997. Finding that local commissioners and supporters wanted it to continue, CALM was launched as a national charity on 31 March 2006.

Until 2011 CALM was aimed at men aged 15-35. By 2011 it was clear that the volume of male callers aged over 35 was growing and suicide among older men was increasing. So CALM expanded its remit to cover all men in the UK. CALM now supports men and women.

The organisation receives a small proportion of its income from trusts, foundations, local authorities and companies, but the majority of its funding is through charitable giving.
