Advent is a season of expectation and preparation, as the Church prepares to celebrate the coming (adventus) of Christ in his incarnation.

The Christmas season is often celebrated for twelve days, ending with the Epiphany, the coming of the wise men the Magi to Jesus. There is an alternative tradition, in which Christmas lasts for a full forty days, ending with the Feast of the Presentation of Christ in the temple on 2 February (Candlemas).

So, we make no apology this time for focusing on the Joy of Christmas – the feasting and giving, the festivity and fellowship, and above all the freedom to worship and SING Christmas Carols together in church. Remember last year when this was not permitted? Eucharist for St Stephen's Day – Boxing Day, Sunday 26 December

Epiphany Choral Eucharist – Sunday 2 January 10am

May the joy of the angels, the eagerness of the shepherds, the perseverance of the wise men, the obedience of Joseph and Mary, and the peace of the Christ child be yours this Christmas and always.

Food and Festivity

Christmas is the great Christian festival, when we celebrate the birth of Jesus, born of Mary, son of God. It's a time of songs, presents, treats and feasts for family and friends. Today the season has been largely secularised, but remains a few days when we relax, exchange gifts and sense some magic in the air. Even when celebrations were effectively cancelled in 2020 during



Charles Dickens was a hugely popular Victorian author, and his Pickwick Papers featured innumerable feasts enjoyed at hostelries across the land. Groaning boards of meats, pies, game, fish, followed by plum puddings and jellies were standard fare for his jolly travellers. Even if many households who read the

the covid pandemic, most of us managed to salvage a little of that special feeling, and eat the mince pies.

In Bromley, our notion of 'the festive season' is largely modelled on traditions established by Queen Victoria, and by her contemporary author, Charles Dickens. Nine children born in guick succession ensured that the Royal household in the 1840s did not lack little ones to squeal over present-giving, party food and lavish entertainment. Lighting and decorating an immense fir tree must have been a special delight, a tradition which Prince Albert brought from Germany, and introduced at Court. The Christmas Tree quickly caught the nation's imagination, and became an indispensable tradition here. Candles gradually became symbolic of gentle love and awe on most special occasions, long after they were replaced by gas and electric for mundane lighting. We still rely on scented candles to instil a serene and peaceful mood.

articles rarely had the chance to enjoy such luxuries, the appetite for reading about mouth-watering banquets was as great then as it is now. The Dickensian Christmas was firmly established in The Christmas Carol, a moral tale pointing up the dire consequences of being too stingy to enjoy the celebrations. Luckily, like all good stories, Mr Scrooge sees the error of his ways, and gets to enjoy the feasting and seasonal goodwill.

Dickens himself lived in style at Gad's Hill near Rochester, and in 1866 hosted Boxing Day sports for 2000 local people, together with a house full of guests and relatives, who stayed till 7 January.

We will have chance to enjoy something even more spectacular in June 2022, when we celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. A unique commemoration of 70 years service by Her Majesty, and chance for us all to party in our own style.

Surprised by Joy

As a child I was entranced by reading 'The Lion, The Witch and The Wardrobe' and the other 'Chronicles of Narnia' by C.S. Lewis, a lay theologian, writer and academic, whose radio broadcasts on Christianity during The Second World War inspired many people. Perhaps you have encountered his books or seen the



moving film 'Shadowlands' about how he found love late in life and the grief of losing his wife.

The young Clive, or Jack as he was always known, had been wonderstruck by Beatrix Potter's animal adventures and later on the epic tales in the Norse sagas and Greek and Irish mythology, but how did his lived experiences influence his thinking, I wondered. Losing his mother, unhappiness at school and the horrors of the trenches in the First World War led him to stop believing in God and received wisdom. He wrote:

"Had God designed the world, it would not be A world so frail and faulty as we see.'

However, he was a brilliant scholar and teacher at Oxford, and later on, influenced by his good friend J.R.R. Tolkien, he returned to Christianity and became a committed Anglican, but was keen to overcome sectarianism and focus on common beliefs shared by all denominations.

Reflecting later on in the autobiography of his early life, 'Surprised by Joy', Lewis recalls his early days as a mixture of amusement and pain, but always suffused with an intense longing for a kind of sublime vision beyond words. He tells us of how he accidentally discovers this 'Joy' and then searches and yearns to experience it further. Eventually we and he reach the end of the quest and discover the true nature and purpose of Joy and its place in his life, when he is reunited with his Creator God and his Saviour, the Lord Jesus Christ.

He said that Joy is like a 'signpost' to those lost in the woods, pointing the way, and that its appearance is not as important 'when we have found the road and are passing signposts every few miles'.

Sitting in a wooden paneled corner of his favourite watering hole 'The Eagle and Child' in St. Giles, Oxford, I can return again to the back of an old wardrobe, shake off my coat and emerge into a better and brighter world.

As Christmas time every year, one of the hallmark services of the year which typically takes place on or around Christmas Eve, is the Service of Nine Lessons and Carols. This traditional, joyous service is celebrated by millions around the world and combines to tell the Christmas story in nine bible readings alongside the singing of carols. In this article, I will look at the origins of this famous service.

The early beginnings of the Nine Lessons and Carols dates to the Victorian era. During this time, Christmas carols were starting to be introduced into public worship. Consequently, a prominent composer and organist at the time, John Stainer, incorporated carols into Choral Evensong at St Paul's Cathedral. This led to other Cathedrals including carols at Christmas that year.

With the popularity of carols growing, it was two years later in 1880 that the first formal service of Nine Lessons and Carols came about. This took place on Christmas Eve 1880 at Truro Cathedral, conducted by the then Bishop of Truro, Edward White Benson. It occurred because Benson was so alarmed at the high levels of alcohol consumption taking place at Cornish pubs, he thought a religious celebration of this kind would keep people out of them and instead entice them to come to church. The resulting service attracted 400 people and took place in a wooden building (as Truro Cathedral was still under construction), with the service ultimately becoming the first of its kind.

In recent history, the service has been popularised by King's College Cambridge. It was first held at the College in 1918 after the Dean of King's, Eric Milner-White, who had just served as an army chaplain in World War I, believed the horror of war had turned people against religion. He proposed to the College that the service originally founded by Benson - would entice people back to Christian worship.

The consequent service in 1918 at King's was a huge success. Evidence of this was further highlighted years later in 1928 when it began being broadcast on the radio (and television in 1954), courtesy of the BBC. Since then, the service has been broadcast annually both here and around the world to millions of people. It now regularly takes place overseas too, with the colourful history of the Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols at King's certainly inspiring joy throughout the world.

Joy to the World

The well-known carol "Joy to the World" is a staple addition to carol services far and wide at Christmas. It's uplifting words perfectly encapsulates the joyous,



celebratory mood that the birth of Christ represents in Christian faith. But what can we gleam from this carol that brims with so much "joy"?

The carol was written by celebrated hymn writer Isaac Watts in 1719. Interestingly, the carol is inspired and based upon Psalm 98, verse 4:

"Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth; break forth into joyous song and sing praises."

What is apparent is that the psalm has nothing to do with Christmas, suggesting that Watts did not have Christmas in mind when he wrote, what then would have been considered, a hymn. Furthermore, the contents of the psalm indicate "Joy to the World" is not about Jesus as the

new-born king, but rather his second coming. Aside from the fact this joyous carol was not originally written for Christmas, its message is still incredibly pertinent and

translates magnificently to the Christmas story and what the birth of Christ signifies. The reference to "every heart prepare him room" in the first verse of the carol reminds us of the Christmas story, where Mary is unable to find room at the inn, as well as the literal confirmation to maintain our belief in Christ.

The sense of celebration through the repetition of 'repeat the sounding joy' in another verse of the carol, relates to the sense of fulfilment that Christ's birth represents to Christians and the sense of elation that comes with it. The buoyant lyrics urges everyone to sing with 'joy', which is particularly fitting with the unity shown by congregation's, who come together every year to sing and celebrate the birth of Christ with friends and family.

In conclusion, it is very apparent why this carol is so popular around the world, as its upbeat nature certainly resonates with the masses, at what is arguably the most upbeat, joyous time of year in Christian faith.
